WHY ALASKA? WHY NOW?

Recently, The National Center for Outdoor & Adventure Education sought and received a \$25,000 National Park Service Challenge Cost Share Program Grant for sending select Education Without Walls students on a *trip of lifetime* to Wrangell-St. Elias National Park and Preserve.

There, 10 motivated and positive youth will work alongside an NPS archaeologist to restore significant sites within the Chititu Historic Mining Landscape – an area where structures and features have been degraded by the encroaching forest and harsh weather, and have not received maintenance in years.

In addition, the 10 participating students — all of whom are committed to personal and academic goals — will continue to learn about themselves and what they're capable of accomplishing with proper planning and follow-thru.

ADVENTURE FIRST.

Wilderness is for everyone

Many students who flounder in the classroom flourish in the wilderness. These are the students who learn best by doing and achieve most by applying their knowledge and skills to real-life settings and situations.

The National Center for Outdoor & Adventure Education's Education Without Walls program provides these learning opportunities and environments. By guiding 10 deserving local youth on a *trip of a lifetime* to Wrangell-St. Elias National Park and Preserve in Southeast Alaska, we will continue to:

- Prepare local students with the self-reliance and skills necessary to safely travel in the backcountry, as well as to transfer the learning and outcomes from the Alaskan experience to daily life back home.
- Help students develop effectual communication skills, understand the importance of making positive personal choices, and guide them on the path to becoming active and influential members of their community.

EDUCATION ALWAYS.

Year-round and everywhere

Education Without Walls (EWW) – a year-round program – is designed to help youth improve their understanding and practice of environmental stewardship, civic responsibility, decision making, interpersonal communication, leadership abilities, and outdoor technical skills.

Many of the students participating in the Wrangell-St. Elias National Park and Preserve trip will qualify to apply to receive high school credit for Environmental Studies, Physical Education, and Outdoor Leadership.

Students who participate in Education Without Walls programming exhibit positive academic growth:

- ▶ 81% improved or maintained the percentage of classes passed
- ▶ 97% were successfully promoted to the next grade
- ▶ 78% report an increase in levels of self-actualization
- Graduation rates are 20% above that experienced by non-participating students

JULY 2017 ALASKA EXPEDITION

Itinerary At-A-Glance:

- Day 1: Fly from Wilmington, N.C., to Anchorage, AK – Drive to Wrangell-St. Elias National Park and Preserve.
- Days 2-5: Prep day Prepare food and gear, finalize route and expedition planning, complete bear safety training, finalize work plans with National Park Service archeologist.
- Day 6: Bush flight From McCarthy to May Creek, and then onto setting up camp in Wrangell St. Elias National Park and Preserve.
- Days 7-14: Backpacking and trail maintenance
- Along with day hikes and treks, the team will work at Chititu Camp to remove and replace deteriorated bear fences, as well as address trail brush and replace deteriorated water-bars, and expose trail heads and branch routes. Approximately 6 miles of trail work will be completed in all.
- Days 15-19: Archeological restoration work
- Working aside a Wrangell St. Elias National Park and Preserve archeologist, the team will work to restore the entire Chititu Historic Mining Landscape, which includes removing brush and growth, and exposing archeological landscapes found in the rock at the Chititu Camp.
- Day 20: Bush flight From Chititu Camp to McCarthy, followed by a drive to Anchorage.
- > Day 21: Fly from Anchorage, AK to Wilmington, N.C.

A CULTURAL LANDSCAPE IN NEED OF RESTORATION

The Chititu Camp Historic Cultural Landscape contains 30+ structures and features that exemplify the domestic and industrial culture of a mid-20th Century mining camp. Additional structures and features dot the trail between May Creek and the camp. Chititu Camp itself has become seriously overgrown, while the same is true for the structures along the trail.
